But you stated in the Abstract "The results obtained turns out anonymity, invisibility, asynchronicity, and dissociative imagination **account for 1.5%** on cyber incivility." and in the Result, "the **determination of R-0.015 Square** that shows the influence of the anonymity, invisibility, asynchronicity, and dissociative imagination of **1.5%** against cyber incivility, While of 98.5% was influenced by other factors."

You may remember their landmark article based on decades of their own and other's research on goals in the American Psychologist: Building a practically useful theory of goal setting and task motivation: A 35-year odyssey.*

*Dragoș Iliescu is a Professor of Psychology with the University of Bucharest. Beside his academic career, he has been active as a consultant for the past 20 years, being involved in and having led important projects related to tests, testing and assessment (among them more than 100 test adaptation projects), mainly in East Europe, but also in Asia, Africa, and South America. His research interests group around two domains: applied psychology in the occupational and human resources area, and psychological assessment, tests and testing (with an important cross-cultural twist). Dragoș Iliescu has served in various capacities for a number of national and international professional associations; he is the current President (2016-2018) of the International Test Commission (ITC). He is an Associate Editor for the European Journal of Psychological Assessment, and the author of over 100 scientific papers, book chapters and books, among them the co-Editor of the acclaimed ITC International Handbook of Testing and Assessment, published in 2016 by Oxford University Press, and the author of an important monography (Adapting tests in linguistic and cultural situations) published with Cambridge University Press.*

Testing and assessment is possibly the single most influential contribution of psychology to the repertoire of scientific methods.

But testing and assessment has evolved in meandering and not always straightforward ways during the past 100 years, combining today a number of extremely modern approaches, but being also tributary to historical artefacts that cannot be considered up to par with scientific requirements.

In the same way in which we promote today an evidential basis in those areas of psychology that are dedicated to interventions (e.g., evidence-based psychotherapeutical interventions, evidence-based management), we should promote an evidential basis in psychological testing and assessment.

This lecture will concentrate on the definition of evidence-based assessment, will discuss the different ways in which evidence-based assessment may be approached in clinical, educational and work psychology, and will finally focus on a number of utility analyses related to evidence-based psychological assessment, as opposed to more traditional methods of assessment that do not always have an empirical basis. INDUSTRY MEETING: Three Steps to Increasing the Productivity of  
Your Employees

The application of three psychological concepts, based on over a 1000 studies, will increase the productivity of employees. The first is goal setting. Goals instill meaning in otherwise tedious tasks. They give people a sense of purpose. Their attainment gives people

Even when goals are specific and challenging, people may not choose to improve their productivity. Thus, a second psychological concept key to productivity improvement is outcome expectancy. That is, employees must see the relationship between pursuing goal attainment and the positive outcomes they can expect. If employers understand the outcomes that employees expect from pursuing the goal, they will understand why employees say what they say, and why they do what they do. If employers change the negative outcomes employees expect from goal pursuit, they will gain goal commitment.

Even when employee outcome expectancies are positive, employees may not commit to the attainment of one or more challenging goals because they lack the confidence that they have the ability to attain them. Thus, I will discuss ways to increase an employee's self efficacy. Self efficacy is the third psychological concept that is key to productivity improvement. It is an employee's belief/conviction that "yes, I can" rather than "no, I can't. (Gary Latham)

## Workshop: *cancelled*

**WORKSHOP TITLE: Psychological Test Adaptation: Application in Research and Clinical Settings**

This 1-day workshop serves as an introduction to the latest standards in testing and assessment, from a research perspective of test adaptation methods. It thus serves a two-fold purpose. The first part introduces participants to conceptual and statistical methods for translating and adapting tests from one language to another. It uses practical examples of adaptations conducted in non-English speaking countries to exemplify the application of the ITC Guidelines on Adapting Tests, and the 2014 Standards for Educational and Psychological Testing (APA, AERA, NCME, 2014). This first part will attract participants who use tests in research and

assessment, discussing how culturally adequate testing portfolios or repertoires may be constructed in countries where test development is still emerging. Interested participants include all professionals who use tests (ranging from rating scales, to cognitive and personality tests) in public or private settings.

The goals of this workshop are twofold. First, we aim to equip attendees with the technical knowledge and basic skills needed for adapting tests into Indonesia. Second, we aim to empower attendees to think strategically at the manner in which psychological assessment is conducted and the manner in which it may be improved on the short-term with even minute efforts, through such approaches as the proper combinations of adequate psychological instruments, training for competent test users and publicity towards informed clients.

The workshop is intended to take 8 hours, in 4 2-hours sessions (2 sessions, i.e. 4 hours, before lunch, and the same after lunch).

No pre-workshop preparation is required. The workshop will be conducted in a face-to-face manner and provided materials and expected interactions will be paper-and-pencil. (**Dragoş Iliescu**)

**Abstract.** Education may improve the knowledge how to build the people attitude especially environmental aware surrounding it. The aim was to study about environmental education of the local wisdom people in conserving their environment. The method was qualitative descriptive using second document, questioner/interview instrument and field observation. This research is done in local wisdom of *Ammatoa* Kajang village (South Sulawesi). The respondents were elderly people (*tetua adat*), local government and people (15 adult couples and 15 children). The majority of local people was educated at elementary school. Environmental education is studied in school, however informal education is heritated from elderly people. The field study showed that the people keep the environment wisely. 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# The Relationship between Socio Cultural Background and Sport Achievement

**Abstract.** The aim of this research was to find out the relations between social cultural background of people of North Sumatera province in Indonesia (helper, show off, dominate, self-ego, hard worker, independent) in relation to sport achievement. This research used descriptive method by reviewing existing literature. Sample of this research was 1072 athletes from 34 different group of sport that have been participating in National Sport Competition (PON) in years 2004, 2008, 2012, 2016. The result shows that nine different kinds of self-defence group have been chosen by 291 athletes such as: fencing, wrestling, Judo, Karate, Pencak Silat, Taekwondo, Tarung Derajat, Boxing and Whusu. In contrast, 781 athletes preferred to another kinds of sport than self-defence, 148 for measurable sport, 143 for accuracy sport, and 490 for games sport group. Eventually, self-defence athletes always contribute highest medals in each national sport competition event. In conclusion, the research shows that social-cultural background of people of North Sumatera has significant relationship to the sport achievement. The implication of research's results can be utilized as a basic talent scouting and talent development for determining young talented athletes in North Sumatera.

# Technological solution for vulnerable communities: Questioning the sustainability of Appropriate Technology

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**Abstract.** Vulnerability eradication has become an emerging concern in today's society following the increasing uncertainties in achieving societal resilience, particularly in vulnerable communities. Furthermore, incorporating technological solution, especially appropriate technology (AT), into such concern requires interdisciplinary understandings to achieve a holistic eradication based on the particularities of each community. This study aims to briefly reveal existing scholarly discourses and investigate potential gap(s) between previous researches. Literatures, particularly consisting meta-analysis on previous scholarly discussions, are surveyed. The findings reveal three progress among scientific discourses. The first one is the paradigm shift of developmental purposes from typical development to empowerment. Next, concerns in technology development indicate the parallel movement toward empowerment. Then, previous methodological developments, including approach in sustaining AT, indicate the needs to assess the future based on sustainability. Therefore, a new research is proposed to develop an assessment framework on AT for vulnerability eradication on the basis of empowerment paradigm, extended focuses in technology development, and extended coverage of future changes in dynamic matter. The framework needs to be developed based on the combination of positivist-deductive-qualitative research paradigms. This is intended to generalize the framework for being used in different cases, to build an applicative framework as an integral part of existing body of knowledge, and to develop an enriched and flexible construction of framework. Looking at existing researches, this brief study proposes insights to move scientific progress toward a more holistic vulnerability eradication using AT solution both in conceptual and practical levels.

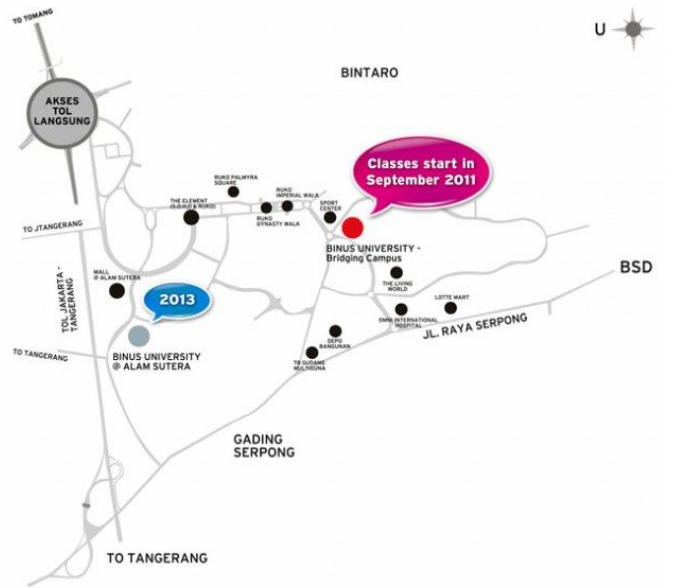
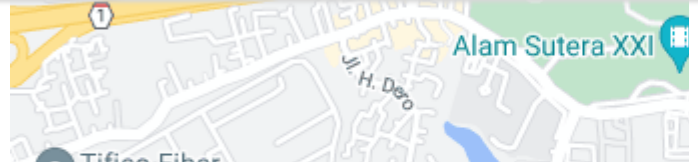
